# History of Bratislava

From 1526 to 1784 Bratislava was the capital city of Hungary. The Habsburg rulers were crowned in St. Martin's cathedral. The Bratislava castle was the residence of Austrian royal family until it was destroyed by fire. In 1918 became part of Czech and Slovak Federal Republic. In 1992 Slovakia became independent country and Bratislava capital city.

# History of Vienna

From 1558 to 1918 it was an imperial city. In 1867 Vienna, Austria became part of Austro-Hungarian Empire. From 1938 to 1945 Vienna was a part of Adolf Hitler's "Greater" Germany. In 1919 of the First Republic of Austria.

# Art connection
